Who evaluates internship? What are the criteria for evaluation? The Director of Public History ensures that the internship will meet the requirements of the degree prior to placing the student in the internship. The student writes an internship prospectus outlining the requirements and expectations of the internship as written by the host institution; it is approved by the onsite supervisor, the Director of Public History and agreed to by the student prior to beginning the internship. The onsite supervisor evaluates the student's performance based on the following criteria: fulfillment of internship obligations, attention to detail, understanding of archival or museum studies principles as applied in this internship, effective communication, ability to make archival or museum studies decisions, and completion of all assigned duties. The student must submit an internship report at the conclusion of the experience. This is evaluated by the Director of Public History who assigns the grade based on the onsite supervisor's assessment and the student's report.
