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## Upcoming Webinar Will Share Findings of First-of-its-Kind Survey about Gender Discrimination and Sexual Harassment in History Organizations

Indianapolis, IN and Nashville, TN – The National Council on Public History (NCPH) and the American Association for State and Local History (AASLH) have partnered to conduct a first-of-its-kind study on the prevalence of gender discrimination and sexual harassment in history organizations in the United States.

The findings of the survey will be shared during a webinar on Tuesday, April 19 at 3 p.m. Eastern Time.

In September of 2020, NCPH and AASLH <u>launched a year-long survey about sexual harassment and gender discrimination in public history organizations</u>. The survey and report are the culmination of an effort begun by members of NCPH's board-led Subcommittee on Gender Discrimination and Sexual Harassment (GDSH).

NCPH and AASLH contracted with <u>Oberg Research</u> to create a report to the public history field analyzing the survey data to understand about how gender discrimination and sexual harassment take place; who is most vulnerable, and where they are most vulnerable; and what current workplace and professional association policies and best practices can do to create safer, more equitable and inclusive work environments.

The report analyzing the survey data will be released on Thursday, April 14 and will be available on both the NCPH and AASLH websites (<u>www.NCPH.org</u> and <u>www.AASLH.org</u>).

At the webinar on April 19, staff and committee members from NCPH, AASLH, and Oberg Research will walk through this inaugural report and discuss its significance. **Participants will be encouraged to share feedback about how the field should respond** to the report's findings.
